Curator's Notes

Hawaiian Mission Houses first presented Cemetery Pupu Theatre the summer of 2011. Working with Dr. Tom Woods and Nanette Napoleon, we assembled a stellar cast: William Ha'o as Detective Kealoha on the Gil Jamieson kidnapping case, Nyla Fujii-Babb as Pi'ilani the wife of the famous Ko'olau the Leper, Jeff Gere as a firefighter responding to the Pearl Harbor attack, Cecilia Fordham as Mary Dominis, and Mike Smola as William Halford the coxswain of the USS Saginaw. Ten years later, we have developed nearly 50 portrayals and have amassed thousands of pages of research materials on these important people.

It has been amazing to see this program grow over the last decade. Cemetery Pupu Theatre now travels to neighbor islands, to schools and community groups, and even toured New England! Over the years, we have covered many aspects of our shared history within the topics of medicine, life at sea, the environment, the arts, newspapers, education, public service, and women's suffrage. I want to recognize Costume Designer Peggy Krock and Director William Ha'o, as they have been with Cemetery Pupu Theatre since the very beginning and are still with us for this special 10th anniversary presentation! --Mike Smola, Curator of Public Programs

CAST



Karen Valasek, originally from Sunnyvale California, has been on O'ahu with husband and fellow thespian, Richard Valasek, for 34 years. She has been on stage in various theaters for 32 of those years. Karen has previously portrayed Dr. Sarah Emerson and Cherilla Lowrey for Cemetery Pupu Theatre.

Cherilla Lillian Lowrey (1861 – 1917) was the founder and first president of the Outdoor Circle whose mission was to "Keep Hawai'i clean, green and beautiful." Twenty-two Monkeypod trees were planted in A'ala Park as its first tree planting project. The Outdoor Circle celebrated its centennial in 2012 and is still active.



Albert Ueligitone grew up in American Samoa, later moving to Honolulu to study theater at the University of Hawaiʻi at Mānoa. He has performed onstage at Kennedy Theater, Kumu Kahua Theatre, Hawaiian Mission Houses, and Maui Arts and Culture Center.

Curtis Piehu Iaukea (1855-1940) – Born in Waimea on Hawai'i Island, Curtis served the Kingdom, Provisional Government, the Republic, and the Territory. He was Governor of O'ahu 1886 to 1887 and served as the Chamberlain to the royal household. He was also the Secretary of the Territory and Acting Governor.



Karen Kaulana is a graduate of the University of Hawai'i with degrees in Journalism, and Theater and Drama. She is a 35-year veteran of the stage, having acted in numerous community theater and professional productions. She previously has portrayed Lucy Kaopaulu Peabody and Wilhelmine Kekelaokalaninui Dowsett for Cemetery Pupu Theatre.

Hali[•]*a* (meaning memory, a fond recollection, to recall, to recollect) – The smallpox epidemic of 1853 killed nearly 6,000 people over the course of 8 months in 1853 and early 1854, roughly 8% of the total population of the Kingdom. This composite character draws on first-hand accounts of these harrowing 8 months in Honolulu.

CAST



Moses Goods is one of Hawai'i's most prominent theatre artists. Originally from Maui and now based in Honolulu he has traveled nationally and internationally performing his original work. Moses' work ranges from full length plays to theatrical storytelling pieces, many of which are rooted in Hawaiian Culture.

David Malo (1793-1853) – Born in Keauhou on Hawai'i Island, David Malo was a member of the first class at Lahainaluna Seminary. He was instrumental in the compilation of Dibble's History of the Sandwich Islands. He compiled his own Hawaiian history and his historical works are still major primary sources for researchers and scholars today.



Stephanie Conching has directed many productions for regional and university theaters including "Sylvia", "A", "Oliver", "Jackie An American Life", and "Sweeney Todd." She has been seen onstage in "Carousel", "Seussical", "West Side Story", and "Agnes of God." Stephanie recently participated in Open Your Hearts Wide with Mission House, Playbuilders of Hawaii, Inc., and the PA'I Foundation.

Mary Bishop Dowsett (1808 - 1860) was the wife of Capt. Samuel Dowsett, who was lost at sea on board the ship Victoria on a pearl-hunting expedition in 1834 in the Pescadores Islands. She was born in 1808 in England and arrived in Hawai`i with her husband and 1-year-old daughter in 1828.
